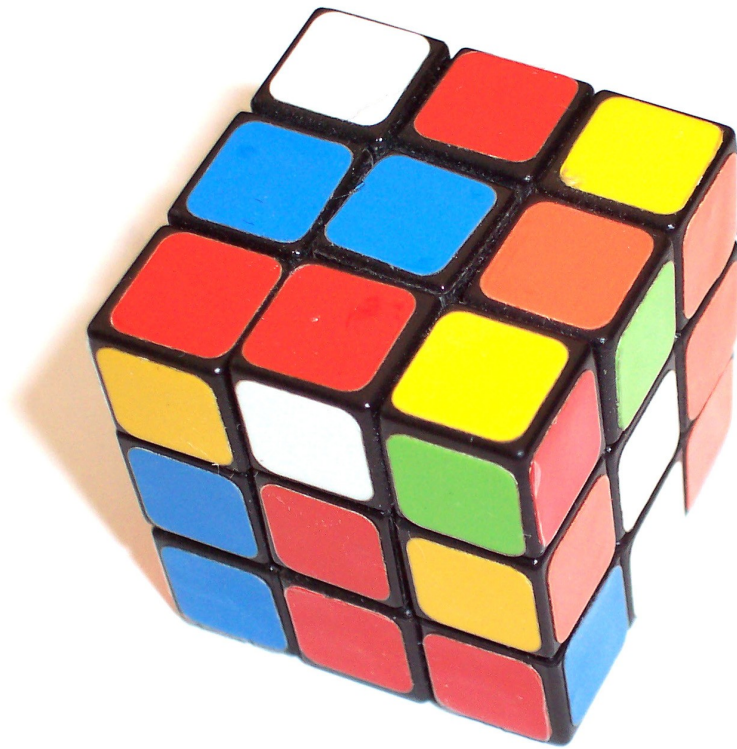
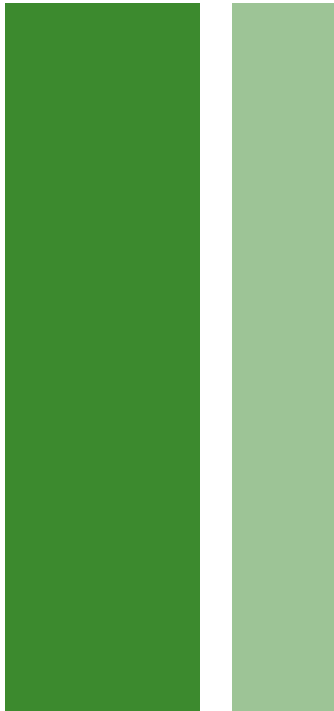

Keynote Speakers

Dr Carlo Leget

Carlo Leget (1964) studied theology in Utrecht (PhD 1997) and taught Moral Theology in Utrecht (2000-2), Medical Ethics in Nijmegen (2002-8) and Ethics of Care in Tilburg (from 2009). His topics of interest include ethics and spirituality in palliative care.

Prof Marie Fallon

Higher Specialist Training in Palliative Medicine and Research Degree with Prof Geoffrey Hanks in St Thomas' Hospital, London and in Bristol. Held post of Senior Lecturer in Palliative Medicine in Glasgow and Edinburgh, and currently (since 2006) St Columba's Hospice Chair of Palliative Medicine, University of Edinburgh and Honorary Consultant in Palliative at the Western General Hospital, Edinburgh. Research background in opioids, difficult cancer pain and barriers to symptom control. Member of University of Edinburgh's Translational Research Programme with particular interest in cancer-induced bone pain. Chief Investigator on a large portfolio of clinical studies which examine improved management of cancer-induced bone pain, neuropathic pain, the role of systematic inflammation and opioid-induced hyperalgesia. Chief Investigator of 3 large CRUK-funded randomised controlled trials. Former medical volunteer in South America and continues to help Palliative Care Programmes there. Member of Advisory Board for Dimpleby Cancer Care. Chair of the Cancer Pain Sub Group of the NCRI Palliative Care Clinical Studies Group. Editorial Board of Palliative Medicine Editor of three editions of ABC of Palliative Care (Blackwells) and Textbook of Cancer Pain (Arnold). Joint Editor of the Oxford Textbook of Palliative Medicine 4th Edition.

Barbara Pointon

Lectured in music at Cambridge, but took early retirement to care for her husband who was diagnosed at 51 with Alzheimer's Disease - a sixteen-year journey, documented in ITV's film *Malcolm and Barbara...Love's Farewell (2007)*. Through conferences, professional publications and the media, she campaigns for a better understanding of people with dementia and their carers, receiving an MBE in 2006. She is an Ambassador for the Alzheimer's Society and for Dementia UK, a member of the Standing Commission on Carers and the Care Quality Commission's Carers Advisory Board. Having contributed to the shaping of the National Dementia, End of Life and Carers' Strategies, and to Alzheimer Europe's strategy for End of Life Care, she is actively involved in their implementation and in training Health and Social Care workforces in hands-on dementia care.

Prof Alyn H Morice

Professor Morice qualified at Cambridge University and after House jobs in London undertook research (MD) into the pharmacology of asthma at St Mary's Hospital. As Clinical Lecturer at Addenbrooke's Hospital Professor Morice developed his interest in cough, demonstrating cough hypersensitivity caused by ACE inhibitors. In 1989 Professor Morice was appointed as Senior Lecturer in Sheffield developing a Pulmonary Vascular service and the first UK Cough Clinic. In 1998 Professor Morice was appointed to the Foundation Chair in Respiratory Medicine in Hull University (now part of Hull York Medical School). The Cough Clinic has become the largest centre within Europe with an international pattern of referral. Unique investigational strategies provide diagnosis and treatment advances which are incorporated into national and international guideline documents. Professor Morice has led the ERS and BTS Taskforces on Cough.

Dr Miriam Johnson

Miriam Johnson is Senior Lecturer in Palliative Medicine at Hull-York Medical School and honorary consultant to St Catherine's hospice, Scarborough. She has research interests in breathlessness and venous thromboembolism. She is a member of the NCRI palliative care clinical study group, its international breathlessness research sub group and is an elected member of the Association for Palliative Medicine (UK)'s science committee. She holds two current NIHR grants (oxygen for people with chronic heart failure, and clinical decision making in VTE in people with advanced cancer) and has just completed a SuPaC funded project in non-pharmacological management of breathlessness. She is a co-director of the Thrombosis in Advanced Disease Alliance. She is lead palliative care research clinician for her cancer network and is local specialty group lead for palliative care for the NEYNL region. In conjunction with the local cardiologists, she has developed one of the first joint services for heart patients in the UK.

A Cognitive Behavioural Therapy

Dr Kathryn Mannix

Kathryn trained as a Cognitive Therapist in 1992 and after appointment as a consultant in palliative medicine she set up the first CBT service specifically for palliative care patients. The success of this service has sparked the development of a training programme in CBT skills for palliative care practitioners. Her CBT experience includes working with patients with diverse illnesses including advanced cancer, motor neuron disease and cystic fibrosis to improve mood, enhance coping and reduce the impact of symptoms. Kathryn has a research interest in the development of CBT training and has worked with investigators in the North East and at the Institute of Psychiatry in London to investigate the impact on practitioners and on patients of training palliative care professionals to use CBT skills.

C Using topical drugs for analgesia

Dr Mark Jansen

Mark Jansen is a hospital pharmacist and clinical pharmacologist at TweeSteden and St. Elisabeth Hospital in Tilburg, the Netherlands. Besides his work in the hospital pharmacy he also is a consultant in two nursing homes and member of the Palliative Care Advisory team in this region. He studied pharmacy at the University of Utrecht after which he specialized as a hospital pharmacist in Rijnstate Hospital in Arnhem. His specialization as a clinical pharmacologist was done at the Radboud University Medical Center in Nijmegen. During this period he developed a special interest in palliative care and pain management. Currently he is still doing research in the field of topical opioid analgesia, especially in painful wounds.

E Practice in medical ethical issues

Dr Colin Campbell

Colin Campbell is medical director of Saint Catherine's Hospice, Scarborough, and has a special interest in palliative care for people with neurological diseases. He was co-author in a National Council for Palliative Care paper on artificial nutrition and hydration in end of life care. He has also served on the Association of Palliative Medicine's ethics committee.

Colin was originally a GP in Glasgow for 13 years before starting palliative medicine training in the south Thames area. He has been a consultant in palliative medicine since 2000

G Understanding distress in dementia

Dr Adrian Treloar

Dr Adrian Treloar is a Consultant in Old Age Psychiatry at Oxleas NHS Trust and a Visiting Senior Lecturer at the Institute of Psychiatry, London. In addition to being in charge of Medical Education for Oxleas NHSF Trust from 1999 to 2007, he produced research and helped to write national guidance on the ethics of Covert Administration of medicines. He has developed considerable expertise in the management of dementia through till death at home, and has lectured nationally and internationally on the palliative care of Dementia, as well as delirium and the management of Parkinson's disease. He has pioneered advanced care of dementia at home, enabling several dozen patients to live at home until their death, and has both researched and developed understanding of how this can be achieved. He is currently working with the National Council for Palliative Care as a member of their cross cutting dementia working group. He coauthored their publication "The Power of Partnership: Palliative Care in Dementia" as well as "Exploring the Palliative needs of Dementia"

B Do we need new drugs for breakthrough pain?

Dr Remigiusz Lecybyl

Dr. Remigiusz Lecybyl graduated at Karol Marcinkowski University of Medical Sciences, Poznan, Poland. His first job was at Palium Hospice and this job generated his particular long-term interest in chronic pain. After part-time study in basic sciences he obtained his PhD degree in molecular biology in 2002 and in 2004 he completed anaesthetic training. From 2005-2008 he worked in King's College London concentrating on pain models, pain biomarkers and pain translation. In 2008 Dr Lecybyl joined NHS and is currently working as a Consultant in Chronic Pain in University Hospital Lewisham. He is an active clinician with interest in neuropathic pain, cancer pain and pain biomarkers. His interests outside work include mountain walking, electronics and physics.

D New non-pharmacological therapies in breathlessness

Anne English

Anne works for East Riding of Yorkshire PCT and Dove House Hospice. She is a physiotherapy clinical specialist and has worked in palliative care for the last 12 years. She obtained a Masters degree in 2009 and has had a book chapter and several articles published on physiotherapy and breathlessness. She runs breathlessness clinics at Dove House Hospice and Castle Hill Hospital and has recently been involved in a research project on breathlessness interventions. Anne is a member of ACPOPC special interest group and is also involved in teaching at Hull University.

F Feeding in end of life care

Dr Kirsten Saharia

Dr Kirsten Saharia trained in Palliative Medicine on the Yorkshire Deanery Training scheme from 2001 to 2008. As a specialist registrar, she undertook research and published in the areas of bone pain and Opiophobia. She took up her post as the first Consultant in Palliative Medicine at the Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals Acute Trust in November 2008. Her interest in feeding and nutrition at the end of life is in response to the many patients for whom this is an issue in the acute hospital setting.

H Critical review of new drugs in palliative medicine

Dr Ben Zylizc

Dr Zbigniew (Ben) Zylizc was born in Poland. He is a Consultant in Palliative Medicine and Medical Director of Dove House, Hull. He trained in General Medicine, Medical Oncology and holds a PhD in Clinical Pharmacology. He worked in the Netherlands for 25 years where, among others, he was the founder of the first Dutch Hospice, Hospice Rozenheuvel in Rozendaal. He is the author of more than 130 papers, several books and numerous chapters in textbooks, printed in three languages. In 2006 he was decorated by HM the Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands with an Officers Cross in the order of Orange Nassau. Areas of interest: pruritus in cancer, opioids pharmacology, opioid induced hyperalgesia and end-of-life-ethics.
